

Bridge of the Month No16 April 2012 Lancs and Yorks and North Eastern Joint Railway

April was an even more frantic month than usual so here we are three days late. Hope to do better in May.

Another demolished bridge with some interesting features. This one at http://g.co/maps/3rnrc near Haxey in Lincolnshire, west of the Trent. At least, I think that's where it is. It's a long time since I took the photo. If I have the right line, it was built as a light railway in about 1900 (http://www.lner.info/co/AJR/timeline.shtml). The Railway is long gone closed in 1956. The farmers have yet to decide that the buried land under the embankment is too valuable to leave but they have removed a chunk of bridge to improve access.



I don't have dimensions either, though this is an access bridge and like most such was probably 12ft (3.66m) span.

The reamains are interesting because they provide cross section details of construction showing how the engineers used brickwork and concrete to best advantage, delivering a robust shell and a cheap and strong interior.



One abutment remains untouched. Here we see the skew arch springing and concrete haunching. A closer look at the right hand side shows rather more detail.



The other abutment has been cut off revealing the internal construction.

The opposite abutment has been cut right back to reveal the internal construction of a brickwork box filled with concrete. The walls are about 18" thick so the voids are about 2'6". That's about 450mm and 750mm.



Here we can see an array of detail. Not only is the relatively thin arch backed with concrete, but the spandrel wall is built a mere 9" (225mm) thick and then concrete cast against the inside.

Also visible in this picture is the asphalt waterproofing applied to the top of the concrete.



A close up of the cut face shows relatively low quality concrete and even the brickwork has mostly empty perpends.
